



How would you describe your career status when you started your GLS program?




Full responses:

- Senior-level; I am looking to make a change before retiring.


Is this your first graduate degree?



If this is not your first graduate degree, what other graduate degrees have you earned? (You may select multiple responses.)




How would you describe your level of experience with the liberal arts prior to joining your GLS Program?


- I earned an undergraduate degree in a discipline of study that is traditionally grouped within the liberal arts at a liberal arts college.

The responses above are shown from left to right as 1-having the strongest influence to 6-having the least.


Which of these goals align with the reasons why you joined your GLS program? (You may select multiple responses.)

- To boost your capacity for innovation and creativity.


Which of the following characteristics of your GLS courses do you consider to be strengths? (You may select multiple responses.)
